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CPC Friends,

I hope you are having a good start to the year. Each year we like to do a full report on what is going on in the life of the church. It serves as a kind of historical record for the

church and provides necessary information for you, the congregation. However, this is also a way to bear witness to what God has been up to in our midst during the past year. As always, with Kingdom work there is a lot to be celebrated and a lot of work that remains. Let's begin with celebration.

#### **JOYOUS OVERVIEW OF 2024:**

This past year was different in that it marked the end of my first year as the official Head of Staff at Columbia. It felt like that was a critical year for evaluation and then action. So, rather than starting lots of new things, we have re-invested in some of the ministries that were already bearing fruit.

MomCo Growth - We continued to invest heavily in the MomCo program (formerly called MOPS). Tifny Mathena, Children's and Intergenerational Ministry Director, who spearheaded this effort in 2023, helped it blossom in 2024. The group grew so much they had to switch rooms and add additional childcare.

Stepping Stones - Last year YoungLife had to back away from its YoungLives program for teen parents. CPC helped lead an effort to continue that program with our leaders and a few volunteers from other churches. While it is still an experiment, the Stepping Stones ministry is steadily providing meals, fellowship, and Bible study. They are looking to invite and welcome new teen parents this winter and spring.

**Facilities** - As several of my letters have mentioned, we need to make some investments in our facilities. After hiring a new Director of Operations, we are prepared to tackle some of those projects. We started with a refresh of the upper parking lot, a refacing of the rotted siding on the upper office building. We are looking to upgrade security, refresh carpeting in the upper offices, and various other neglected projects. You do not even want to see the list of all the things!

#### **Associate Pastor Nominating Committee -**

We launched our APNC to begin a search for a permanent Associate Pastor of Discipleship. Likely this person will be in charge of connection and hospitality for new believers and visitors. They are just in their initial stage of gathering together, but will be communicating with the Session and you in the near future.

Overall, when I look at 2024, I think it has been a good year. We have had some wonderful sermon series, many new folks coming to the church, and a general sense of joy seems to be in the air. While we are having to "refresh and reboot" a little bit here and there, I think CPC is a sign of hope in Clark County. My hope is that spirit will continue into 2025, and will translate to discipleship growth that produces a community shaped by Jesus' mission.

I am hopeful you will continue to pray and support this mission in whatever ways you can!

## **WORSHIP AND MUSIC**


#### HIGHLIGHTS

As a worshiping community, together we enjoyed our regular worship services each Sunday. Our traditional service at 9am includes hymns led by our wonderful organist Garnet Hayes, and the choir providing inspirational anthems. Our 10:30am contemporary services are led by our worship team, which also includes our three high school music apprentices.

We also found it meaningful to observe the Christian calendar by offering special worship opportunities on Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter, Advent and Christmas. We celebrated together with an all-church outdoor worship service in September and again offered our annual Christmas Concert in December.

#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

Our ongoing vision work involves our shared participation as we worship the Lord together through prayer, sermons, singing, choir anthems, and fellowship in our worship services. We gather each Sunday to honor the Lord, and we also feel connected to those who join us





through our livestream services. The worship staff meets each week to determine how best to design our worship services to honor God and serve our community. Just as the pastors spend many hours each week preparing their sermons, the musicians spend many hours preparing the music for worship.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

Once again, the Fall Festival was a highlight as we gathered in our parking lot for worship, followed by lunch and plenty of games and good fellowship. Thanks to the amazing team of volunteers for making the festival a success!



The Guys and Kids Campout discovered that the beach is a wonderful place to camp! Cape Lookout campground provided a beautiful place for us to connect with one another and grow deeper with God. The hardworking Adult Faith Formation Team has been a super group of people to work with! Thank you to the team.





#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

We continue to work on making CPC a place that makes flourishing disciples. This past year we have moved from the big picture view of a healthy tree being planted in good soil, to begin exploring the on-the-ground discipleship and spiritual practices. The women's retreat, led by Rev. Laurel Neal, explored developing a "Rule of Life," which are intentional spiritual practices as part of our everyday living. We are also offering a class on "The Way of Jesus" which will help people discover and incorporate regular spiritual practices into our families and homes. This will continue to be a major emphasis in 2025.

#### SUMMARY OF MINISTRY

2024 was a year in which we moved forward in developing a discipleship plan for the church. Our focus is to continue to be a place where people feel connected, are growing and flourishing as disciples, and are sent out to serve the world. This can only happen when we take time to grow in our faith through spiritual disciplines, and this needs to be done in community. The community of the church is the good soil where disciples can put down roots and grow. We are making good progress in changing the culture of CPC to be a place of flourishing disciples.

I am grateful for the staff, teams, deacons and session

## YOUTH MINISTRY

#### HIGHLIGHTS

This year we emphasized investing in **combined Middle School and K2 Live events** with the goal of being more intergenerational. We combined our Valentine's and Christmas parties. These events provide our students time with different programs as well as a fun environment to hang out with each other. In early September we had a 6th grade "Welcome to Middle School" event and took



ten incoming 6th graders for a night out at Menchies. This time is such a huge transition for our students and it can be intimidating. This event gave our students a chance to dip their toes into the world of Middle School Ministries. This summer we had 11 Children's and Youth Ministry Interns who were hardworking and determined to invest their summer into growing their relationship with God, as well as growing their leadership within CPC. After a 6-year break, our High Schoolers returned to Amor Ministries for Work Camp 2025. This trip was incredible and life-changing for many of our students and leaders. We participated in building three homes in Tijuana, Mexico. Without the congregation's support, this trip is not possible - thank you for all the donations and support. In 2024, youth ministries embarked on six





overnight retreats. We truly believe retreats are at the core of our ethos at CPC. These retreats provide students with experiences and unique moments to get to know each other while also participating in service. Over the course of the year, students grow in their relationships with God, as well as with each other, through these retreats.

#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

As we look to 2025, our goal is to continue to invest in our students' experiences within our community. When a student graduates from high school, we pray that we have provided them unique ways to learn about God and build lasting friendships with each other and our leaders. We continue to focus on lifelong discipleship. Middle and high school are packed with growth, learning, challenges, and our goal is to continue encouraging and strengthening our students through a relationship with Christ.

#### **SUMMARY OF MINISTRY**

Youth Ministries at CPC consist of a rich environment wherestudentswalkinfaithalongsideeachother. Wework toward building up lifelong disciples of Jesus who go out from CPC and share the love of Christ. Our programming is filled with rich Biblical teaching and various relational experiences. Through our weekly programming, yearly retreats, and service projects, our students get to grow in God together. We are dedicated to investing in our

students throughout their middle and high school experiences and beyond.



## CHILDREN'S & INTERGENERATIONAL MINISTRY

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

**Spiritual Development** took a front seat this year as we invested in new curriculums for each elementary age group. We are also continuing our long-held tradition of celebrating spiritual milestones through Bible Sunday, Communion Training, and 5th Grade Promotion.

**Columbia MomCo** grew from four tables to six this year! We meet twice a month, and are blessed by the strong community of women being formed within this group.



VBS 2024, "Scuba", welcomed 100 children and gave 70 volunteers the opportunity to "Dive into Friendship with God" as well as giving the opportunity for families to recycle various items that might otherwise end up in the landfill or ocean. This year we added a BBQ to the last day of VBS. Families, volunteers, and staff had a chance to get to know one another while eating together and enjoying Kona Ice! It was very well received and we are excited to do it again next year!

CPC now has a **Toddler Room**! The addition of this room, (LL7) has allowed us to expand our childcare enrollment in events such as Parents' Night Out and MomCo. It is also being used by the Stepping Stones ministry. We are grateful for this much loved space!

**Preschool**, through MomCo, Parents' Night Out evenings, and monthly reading events led by the CM Director. As new families enroll, they are provided with a welcome video from the CM Director, highlighting our programs and inviting each family to Sunday service.

Intergenerational Activities, including the Advent Wreath Making and Dinner and crafts at the Advent Festival gave opportunities for people of all ages to visit, create, and celebrate together.

The second annual **Lenten Devotional**, written and illustrated by the congregation, was beautifully created with contributions from people of all ages.

Youth Leaders are playing a larger roll in Children's Ministries as we added high school leaders to our Sunday school classes and welcomed one lead and two volunteer CM interns last summer!

Rooted Newsletter gives readers insight into youth and children's programming and education at CPC, while providing Christian resources and encouragement for those raising children.



#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

2025 will continue providing opportunities, rooted in the example of Christ and the Word of God, for people of all

We continue to seek a cohesive discipleship program for all ages. In the coming year, we will focus on giving children the opportunity to participate more directly in worship services, as well as offering another parenting-related class, potentially in the fall.

#### SUMMARY OF MINISTRY

Children's Ministry at CPC seeks to provide a place of care and connection where children and their families can learn and grow in their knowledge and understanding of Jesus Christ and His love for them displayed through the Gospel. This ministry also exists to facilitate the growth





of the Kingdom of God, providing multiple points of connection whenever possible, laying the foundation for true relationships to form and strong foundations to build.





## PASTORAL CARE & VISITATION

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

Since the beginning of April 2024, it has been my privilege to serve as the Pastor of Visitation for Columbia Church. After a 40 year career as a solo pastor of small, rural Presbyterian churches, and then 10 years of being retired, it has been an interesting change to serve in a large suburban church with a big staff. Because I grew up at Columbia, starting in its beginning years, the experience of returning has been fascinating.

My ministry primarily involves making and staying in contact with the older members of our congregation. It has been a blessing to get to know the folks who have played their part in making Columbia what it has been and what it is today.

With the intention of reserving my part time hours for visitation, we have limited my involvement in meetings and with committees. This has resulted in a ministry that is intensively involved with the lives of our members. And that has been privilege for me.

Although my ministry is temporary, I look forward to whatever the future holds in whatever ways I am asked to serve.



## **CHILDREN'S MINISTRY: K2 LIVE**

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

Unique weekly ministry for children – Columbia offers a mid-week program unlike most churches in Clark County that is bringing families through our doors. Family Nights - We had four nights when families joined us to share in the fun with their children and have fellowship with other families. Overnight Retreat at Trout Creek Bible Camp - For the first time in four years, we were able to enjoy a camp experience, feeding the kids' faith and nurturing relationships surrounded by God's beautiful creation. We enjoy sharing the camp with the Middle School Youth Group, including meals and time to worship together. Friendship Bags to Open House Ministries -K2 kids partnered with Open House Ministries to develop friendships with the children who reside there and help support them with their everyday needs. We filled over thirty gift bags for the elementary kids at OHM to deliver in time for Christmas. Welcoming new kids - Over half of our kids this fall were brand new to the program. Praise God for an amazing group of adults and youth leaders who make this ministry possible!



#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

**Family:** Our Secret Pal activity is an intentional way we are involving loving adults from our family of faith, other than their parents and teachers, in the lives of the kids of K2 Live.

Missional: While encouraging and equipping kids to live out their faith outside of Columbia, we also offer a way to serve others in a mission project. In addition to our fall friendship bag project, in the spring we collected items for the Talibé boys in Senegal. We want to guide the kids to respond to Jesus' call on our lives to care for those in need while remembering that we are all equal in God's



eyes as his beloved children.

**Disciplemaking:** Our HighPoint curriculum disciples kids to become more like the person that Jesus is calling them to be, one Biblical character trait at a time and shows kids how to grow in a personal relationship with Christ, the One who builds godly character.

#### **SUMMARY OF MINISTRY**

K2 Live is Columbia's mid-week program for children in third, fourth, and fifth grades. Each Wednesday, twenty-five to thirty kids meet to experience God through large group activities and Bible teaching, small group discussion, gym games, craft projects, mission experiences, and trust and community-building games. Families are included in events four times during the year in an effort to include and encourage them as the primary faith educators of their children.

## **DEACON MINISTRY**

#### HIGHLIGHTS

The thirty-member Deacon Board of Columbia Presbyterian actively participated in spreading God's caring and compassion not only to its own brothers and sisters, but also to our nearby neighbors. These benevolent acts were accomplished through four primary teams:

The **Communion Team** identified servers for each monthly communion service as well as prepared the elements at four stations for each service (an increase). They also provided home communion on 53 occassions to congregants who shared how meaningful this was for them.

Every week the **Hospitality Team** provided greeters for both services, provided assistance at the Welcome Center, and provided parking guidance. They also facilitated fourteen memorial receptions.



The **Service Team** organized and supported four Red Cross blood drives, provided a Helping Hand in accomplishing multiple household projects for several congregants, moved a deacon to their new apartment, plus maintained a generator backup for a housebound congregant. The Team organized and set up two food drives, collecting over 1600 pounds of food and thousands of dollars for the Clark County Food Bank and our neighborhood school's Family Community Resource Centers. This year the Thanksgiving basket project supported 80 family groups comprising an estimated 280 children from the Marshall, McLoughlin, and Heights schools.



The Tender Loving Care Team (TLC) provided cards to our senior church members/friends who are 85 or older, provided Easter and Christmas gifts to our Care Partners, and delivered 47 prayer shawls to those experiencing grief, or illness; twice a month provided a dedicated trained team of people who prayed with anyone needing prayer after both worship services. This TLC team, along with other former deacons, acted as Care Partners for fourteen fragile congregants through emails, phone calls, cards, and personal visits. This year, eight such congregants have either moved or passed away, while nine new folks have been added into our care.

Throughout the year the Deacon Board dedicated its service to the Lord, to further His kingdom both here at CPC and in our local neighborhoods. The deacons have been aided and guided in this ministry of compassion with the support and leadership of Pastor Ted Buck and Pastor Scott Peterson.



## **HEALTH MINISTRY**

#### HIGHLIGHTS

- 13 and 15 volunteers, respectively, made person-toperson visits with WeCare gifts to 40 households in May and 57 in November.
- The annual health fair in November featured seven community exhibitors and nine experts from our own CPC team of healthcare professionals.
- We hosted five Bring Your Own Bag lunches designed for all, but especially for those missing the usual events paused during the summer.
- Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) classes continued this year, both for those working with adults and youth/ adolescents.
- GriefShare, a 13-week program, ran in the spring and also in the fall with 7-15 attendees each week.



#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

We began our ministry in 2019. Our vision/mission is to facilitate the integration of body, soul, and spiritual health; this means addressing needs that may impact physical health, such as social isolation. Our focus heretofore has been primarily to our own community of faith. However, we realize some projects can incorporate others outside of our congregation to facilitate their health. For example, we have begun to have others join the Mental Health First Aid classes but would like to expand our influence in the community. We have made some contacts of community resources, such as PeaceHealth and National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), and hope to collaborate with them and others in the future.



#### SUMMARY OF MINISTRY

The work of the Health Ministry Team (HMT) is led by a certified faith community nurse and a supportive steering committee, made up of several health professional team members as well as a retired nurse educator from another Presbyterian church. Several others who do not have health backgrounds round out the committee. We meet twice a month to share information, listen to feedback, and plan our next activities/projects. In addition to the highlights above, we host one-time classes, provide support to the pastoral staff, stock a mental health brochure rack in the Gathering Area, and are responsive to other needs as they arise. We aspire to be intergenerational, working with Circle of Friends Preschool, and listening for other needs of our faith community.

## PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

#### HIGHLIGHTS

It has been a bittersweet year for Presbyterian Women (PW) at Columbia. We had to realize that our 2024 church sale would be our last one. Although we have had great help from our youth, the adults who have worked the sale for years are getting older and are unable to put in the hours needed to operate the sale. But that final sale was a huge success and we made enough money to support our mission projects through 2026. Any group in the church that would like to take on the sale, please contact PW. We have a lot of equipment you can use.

We also reduced our 2024 gatherings by one, ending the year with a very successful Christmas luncheon. The program was a dramatic reading written by Beth Moore and read by Marilyn Kimble. Sally Stalnaker provided some lovely music.

Our three circles, Ruth, Lydia and Marion/Elizabeth, meet monthly for fellowship and Bible studies. One circle continues meeting via a hybrid of Zoom and in person, while the other two meet in person.

This past year, PW awarded one scholarship to a woman for graduate work.





Through Bible study and fellowship, we encourage our women to pray for and support each other. Through cards of condolence and cheer, we reach out to members of our church on behalf of the PW. Our circles donated food, clothing, toys and gifts to the needy by working with programs within our church and with Safe Choice of the YWCA.

Columbia PW are guided by a shared purpose of Presbyterian Women church-wide: Forgiven and fed by God in Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we commit ourselves to nurture our faith through prayer and Bible study. To support the mission of the Church worldwide. To work for justice and peace; and to build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church (USA) and witnesses to the promise of God's Kingdom.



## Missions

## **MISSIONS MINISTRY**

#### HIGHLIGHTS

Missions Ministry Team (MMT) supported the following ministries and missionaries with funds, communication, volunteer service, and prayer: Clark County Food Bank, Habitat for Humanity, Marshall and McLoughlin schools, Open House Ministries, The Linen Closet, Clark County Young Life, Stepping Stones, Haiti Foundation of Hope, Clean Water for Haiti, and Senegal – the Falls, Baba Garage, MIS, World Vision, Pastor Ngor, Beer Sheba, the Nagelkirks and the Mattocks.

**Stepping Stones** - is holding meetings at CPC the 2nd and 4th Thursdays. CPC volunteers are providing and serving meals and praying for the girls and their families.

Marshall and McLoughlin Schools - CPC volunteers support staff and students with backpacks, shoes, clothing, toiletries, support for Back-to-School events, Thanksgiving baskets and other food items, a bike for the Spelling Bee grand prize, lunchtime activity groups, and staff encouragement events. CPC provided over 200 hours of volunteer time.

**Evergreen Habitat for Humanity** - CPC partnered on 4 build days with over 300 volunteer hours.

**Open House Ministries** (OHM) - CPC volunteers provided over 50 volunteer hours at OHM Resource Fair in August, provided Columbia Play Project for OHM children on two afternoons, supported two rooms by gathering needed household furnishings, and 20 CPC volunteers spent over 100 hours furnishing and decorating two apartments.



Christmas Giving Trees - provided presents and household goods for two OHM families (4 adults and 7 children) and over \$2,500 in gift cards for Stepping Stones and Marshall and McLoughlin school families.

**The Food Drives** - in coordination with the deacons, provided cash and donated food.

Welcomed mission partners - From Senegal: Eric Toumieux with Beer Sheba, Leo Diouf with Project Nicodemus and Feluine Fall from St Louis. Also welcomed missionaries Rich and Joyce Mattocks with Tyndale Bible Translators serving in Papua New Guinea.

**Communication** - MMT continued to bring missions and missionaries in front of the congregation with visit reports, Mission Connections updates during worship, Columbia Weekly articles, trip briefings, intergenerational connections, and classes.

#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

MMT continues to support the global ministries, local ministries and missionaries with funds, communication, volunteer service and prayer. MMT encourages CPC to engage in mission work to encounter God, to enter into a life changing relationship with Jesus and allow the Holy Spirit to show you your place in God's work.

#### SUMMARY OF MINISTRY

MMT communicates and builds relationships with mission organizations and missionaries supported by CPC. We encourage CPC congregants to connect, flourish and serve local and global missions. MMT seeks and screens requests for new missions/missionaries that fit CPC's purpose and vision statements. MMT manages CPC's missions budget by reviewing mission organizations and missionaries funding needs and disperses funds per budget availability. MMT submits an annual budget request to session for approval each fiscal year.

## CIRCLE OF FRIENDS PRESCHOOL

#### HIGHLIGHTS

In May, Circle of Friends Preschool Director Sharon Wallenborn retired after 30 years of service. Sharon was a loving, hard-working, dedicated woman of strong faith who gave her heart and soul to the development of Circle of Friends (COF). In June, Laura Ericcsen accepted the position of Director. Laura joined the COF team in 2010 and worked in various classrooms, started the Two-tsy Pop 2-year old program, created a virtual program during COVID, and worked as the Assistant Director for two years before becoming the Director. COF won The Columbian's Best of Clark County Award for Best Preschool in Clark County for the second year in a row. The Columbian reported that COF won the award by a substantial number of votes over the competition.



#### **ONGOING VISION WORK**

COF is proud to be a ministry of Columbia Presbyterian Church and is committed to representing CPC's commitment to children and families. More and more preschool families attend worship services, classes, or church functions offered at CPC. Some of our most important future work will be to continue nurturing and strengthening our bond with CPC. COF is excited about and dedicated to adding new programs, upgrading, modernizing, and revamping our current activities, events, curriculum, and day-to-day operations and routines. Examples include adding a half-day Kindergarten class in the future, new programs like a "Lunch & Learn" mid-day class to help kids learn elementary lunchtime skills, and adding more Christian-based curriculum into our classroom teaching.



#### SUMMARY OF MINISTRY

COF's mission is to provide and serve preschool-age children and their families with a loving and nurturing family environment. Our goal is to provide our students with a basic foundation of the Christian faith and a consistent, respectful, stimulating learning environment that encourages all aspects of development. COF has 170 students, three parent-and-me two-year-old classes, seven preschool classes, and ten Pre-K classes. Pre-K students who are in classes for three or more days enjoy science every other Wednesday. This year, three enrichment classes are offered: "Little Performers" dance class, "Mini Movers" gym class, and "Espanol con Senorita Kennia" Spanish class. COF continues to be run by a hard-working and dedicated Board of Directors who welcomed three new board members this year.



## COLUMBIA FUTURE FORGE

2024 was a challenging year for the Forge and yet it yielded some incredible fruit for us as a ministry. As you likely know, the Forge is a separate 501(c)(3) from the church, but it sees itself as firmly embedded in the life of CPC. Below we have briefly listed the challenges, celebrations, and future hopes of the Forge ministry.



#### THE CHALLENGES

- Jun Jeong, Utmost Athletic Program Director, transitioned closer to family on the East Coast.
- While we experimented with our first Executive Director, Jennifer Jones, it did not go as we had hoped. Jennifer transitioned in late October.
- We had to take a break from the Hayes Freedom on campus training program because we no longer have the capacity to sustain 12 weeks of trainings.



#### THE WAYS GOD PROVIDED

- We received a \$10k grant from the Price Foundation to directly employ and train larger numbers of students through Mowtown Teen Lawncare. We have our highest, consistent total number of students employed each week with 11.
- We created two new strategic partnerships with Habitat for Humanity and Proud Ground. Both are



housing initiatives in Clark County.

- We had 14 Clark College athletes who were exploring or deepening their understanding of the Word of God through a "Clark Baseball Bible Study."


#### WHAT DOES 2025 HOLD?

## TOTAL MISSIONAL IMPACT



The pie chart you see above was originally shared in our fall Generosity Report. For the last two years, we have produced this graphic to help explain the broader financial impact CPC has on missions - we call this our "Total Missional Impact." It shows how the "Missions" category in our annual budget is only a narrow slice of CPC's actual investsment in mission. Not only do we invest more dollars on mission, we also creatively leverage our facilities and resources to support local ministries that are reaching into our community with the good news of Jesus Christ. Here are some examples of this broader view of missional impact:

- The Columbia Future Forge and Circle of Friends Preschool provide a huge mission impact into the community, but CPC funds these semi-independent ministries minimally. For example, the Columbia Future Forge has a \$300k budget, but each year the church supports the Forge between \$4k-\$19k in terms of direct funding. A small amount of funding has been leveraged into a major amount of mission.
- The Deacons Fund is not directly tied to mission, but the relief it provides to people in crisis, both inside and outside our church, is an extension of our central mission to the poor.
- The High School Work Camp Auction is not visible in the missions budget, but it's proceeds go to a variety of missions outside our church.

Please let us know if this provides a more helpful and comprehensive sense of our missional footprint.

# Church Leadership



## PERSONNEL MINISTRY

#### HIGHLIGHTS

Personnel Ministry Team (PMT) researched and developed compensation metrics to ensure fair and competitive wages for each staff position, implemented the development of personal goals by staff, and revised the staff review process to provide staff with an opportunity to discuss their personal goals with PMT representatives so Columbia can better support the accomplishment of those goals, PMT continued emphasis on personal growth of all staff by replacing study leave with professional development for all nonordained staff. PMT recommended to Session that, based on financial resources, Columbia can support a Lead Pastor/Head of Staff, an Associate Pastor, and a Parish Associate. PMT also identified the need for, and developed a position for, a Director of Operations that will oversee four functional areas: finance, human resources, operations, and technology; as well as oversee special projects.



#### ONGOING VISION WORK

Implementing a time and attendance module to improve the efficiency and accuracy of payroll processing as well as better compliance with Washington State employment laws. Updating the Employee Handbook to ensure personnel policies and benefits are up-to-date and clearly documented. Updating the job descriptions for Lead Pastor/Head of Staff; Associate Pastor and Parish Associate. Supporting staff and ministry teams in the hiring of a Youth Worship Leader and a Director of Operations. Researching/reviewing Washington State employment laws regarding exempt positions to ensure Columbia's compliancy. Monitoring Columbia's evolving



human resource needs to ensure the effective use of current staff and the addition of new staff, if needed.

#### **SUMMARY OF MINISTRY**

PMT's primary responsibility is to collaborate with staff to maintain a healthy work environment. To help accomplish this, the PMT maintains the employee handbook to ensure personnel policies and benefits are up-to-date and clearly documented, develops and maintains job descriptions for each position to ensure roles and responsibilities, as well as required knowledge, skills and experience are documented, develops a salary structure and salary ranges so that all employees are fairly compensated according to their roles and responsibilities, and works with staff to develop and implement policies and procedures that assure compliance with laws, regulations, insurance requirements, and best practices.

2024 members of the PMT included Carol Cate, Ben Stimmel, KT Teng, and Tricia Williamson.



## NOMINATING COMMITTEE

#### HIGHLIGHTS

The Nominating Committee nominates elders and deacons, and in 2024 we had the additional blessing of nominating an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC).

We began meeting in June, and over the summer we discussed nominations for the APNC. On October 20, we presented a slate of nine nominees to the congregation. Elected by a unanimous vote, the APNC consists of: Erin Endreson, Marilyn Kimble, Steve Martin, Jeff Ovall, Brian Randolph, Mary Smith, Ben Stimmel, Aaron Villanueva and Julie Wilcox.
